

## General Licences



# GL 14/2019: To take unsuccessful eggs laid by wild birds from nest boxes

General Licences allow authorised people to carry out activities that would otherwise be illegal under the Wildlife & Countryside Act 1981 (as amended). They cover situations where we accept that there may be no other satisfactory solution. However, they should only be used as a last resort. Operators must be able to explain what other alternatives they have tried if challenged.

### Terms and conditions

If you operate under General Licence 14/2019 you must meet the following terms and conditions otherwise your actions may be illegal which could lead to prosecution.

<b>What can this General Licence be used for?</b>	Authorised people (operators) can take by hand and destroy eggs of wild birds, or any part of such an egg, for the sole purpose of allowing the removal and prompt destruction of abandoned and unsuccessful eggs from nest boxes before the commencement of the next breeding season.
<b>Who is authorised to use this General Licence?</b>	Operators can be the owner or occupier, or any person authorised by the owner or occupier of the land on which the action authorised is taken.
<b>What other information must operators know before considering use of this General Licence?</b>	Operators must: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• understand this General Licence and comply with its terms and conditions</li> <li>• only use it for the purpose of conserving wild birds</li> <li>• only use it where they are satisfied that there is no other satisfactory solution</li> </ul>
<b>When and where is this General Licence valid?</b>	Across Scotland from 1 January to 31 December 2019 unless previously revoked, or a restriction applies.
<b>What restrictions apply to the use of this General Licence?</b>	Those convicted of a wildlife crime on or after 1 January 2014 unless, in respect of that offence, they were either dismissed with an admonition, they are a rehabilitated person (for the purposes of the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974 and that conviction is spent), or a court discharged them absolutely.  <b>Any person not able to use the General Licence can still apply to SNH for an individual <a href="#">licence</a>.</b>
<b>What are the general</b>	1. Abandoned or unsuccessful eggs may not be removed

<b>conditions of this General Licence?</b>	between 01 February and 31 July. 2. Eggs removed from nest boxes shall either be destroyed immediately or sent to an authorised authority (e.g. National Museums of Scotland). If an operator intends to give the eggs to an authorised authority, they must do so within three days of taking the eggs from the nest box.
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### Definitions

For the purposes of this General Licence;

"wild bird" means any bird of a species which is ordinarily resident in or is a visitor to any member State or the European territory of any member State in a wild state but does not include poultry. "Bird" includes all stages from chick to adult.

"wildlife crime" means any offence under the Wildlife & Countryside Act 1981, the Conservation (Natural Habitats &c.) Regulations 1994, the Protection of Badgers Act 1992, the Protection of Wild Mammals (Scotland) Act 2002, the Animal Health & Welfare (Scotland) Act 2006, the Protection of Animals (Scotland) Act 1912 and the Wild Mammals (Protection) Act 1996 (all as amended).



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
