A house of chewed wood

Did you know that wasps are amazing architects? They build their nests out of chewed up wood, which they mould into nests with six-sided (hexagonal) cells. You may see one in a loft or under the eaves of your home.



A growing Family

The queen wasp comes out of hibernation in late spring. She builds a small nest and lays her first eggs. These hatch into workers who make the nest bigger and take over feeding the young.

The end of summer and hibernation

At the end of summer the queen lays some eggs that become male wasps. Other eggs will become queens. Those queens mate and then hibernate until late spring.

Nobody loves me

Wasps may be common, but they are not popular. They like fruit and sweets, so they can be a nuisance at picnics. They are however pollinators, and control pests in gardens and parks as they hunt grubs and caterpillars to feed their young.



At first glance hoverflies can be mistaken for wasps. But look closely – hoverflies hover, and can fly sideways. Hoverflies can't sting you, they are coloured like wasps to stop birds and other predators from eating them.
