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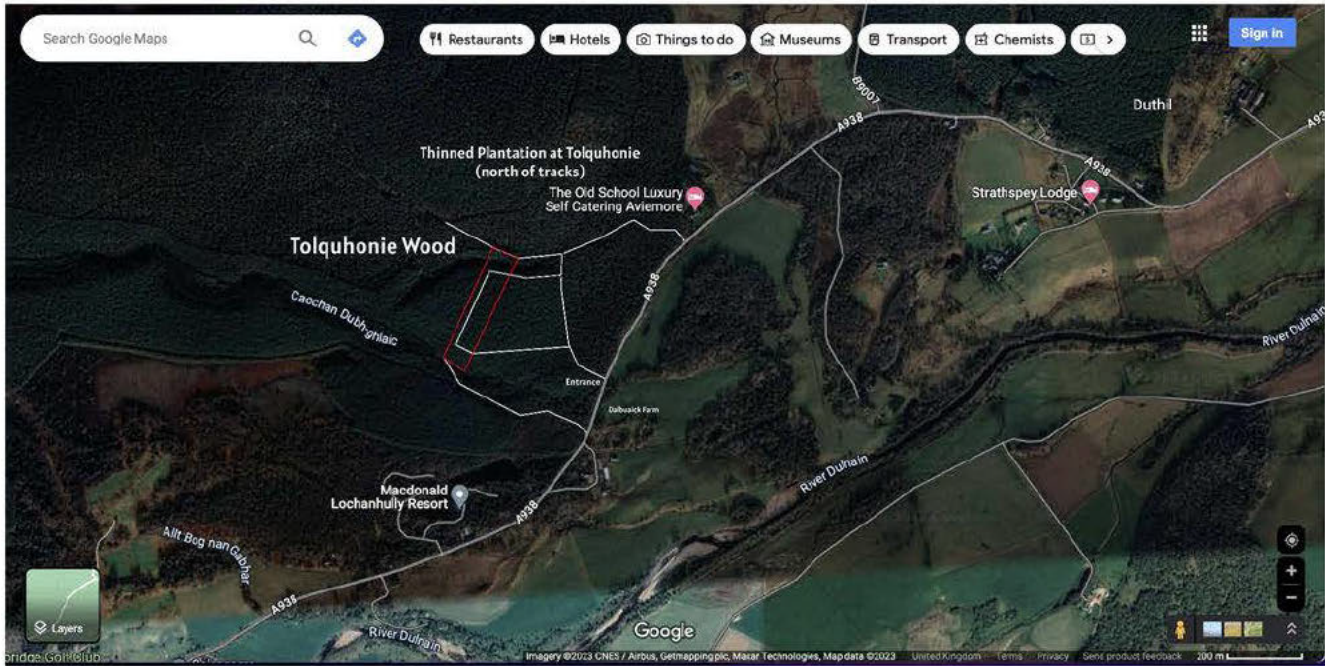
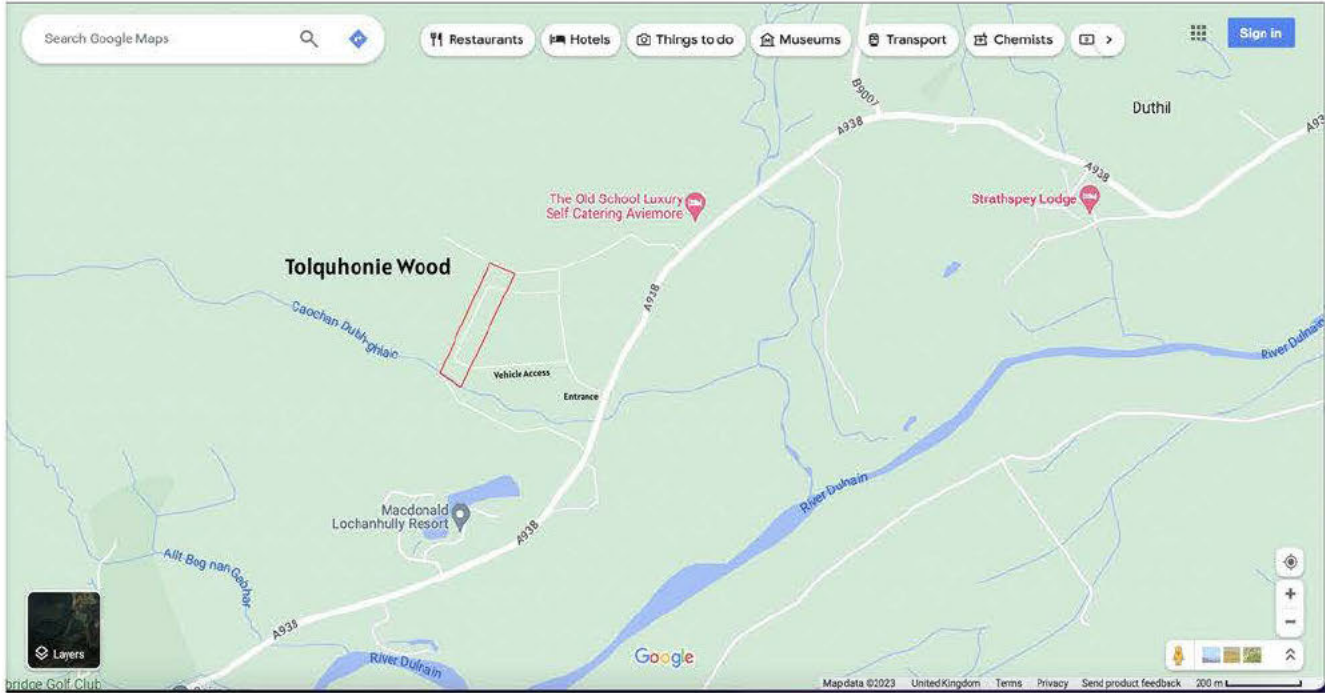

Note: Operations in Table 1 represent the total felling to be carried out within the approval period and not approval per year.

Felling Notes

As a plantation, it is dominated by scots pine and of limited biodiversity. No historic thinning has been carried out on this plot, or immediately adjacent small plots, due to fragmented historic ownership. With congestion, a significant % of self-seeded scots pine is affecting the standing strength and the long-term quality of the woodland. The level of thinning applied for is just 6m3 per acre (average) at 30m3, aiming to improve stand stability and biodiversity, with a sensitive approach. Marked trees will be carefully checked for any signs of habitat/nesting, and timing chosen to avoid disruption. Operations will be done by hand. Forestry tracks and access are favourable. This plot of 5 acres is set among 200 acres of historically un-managed plantation, created in the mid-1970s. Just north is a 200+ acre managed scots pine plantation section, formerly of common ownership, that has been substantially thinned by Scottish Woodlands. The [redacted] neighbour at [redacted] is supportive of woodland management plans. The risk of disruption to any 3rd parties is considered negligible; no known concerns or hazards to any other stakeholders. The plot is surrounded by woodland, making up just 2.5% of the plantation. Cairngorm Woodlands Ltd has purchased this plot to preserve it as forestry, seeking to promote biodiversity and stand stability. Thinning and some restocking with native species will help achieve these aims while also mitigating the risks of storm damage and drought stress. Please see the attached photographs of plantation tree density and limited diversity. Larger healthier trees will be retained. All work will be completed by hand, inspecting trees carefully to avoid wildlife disruption. This mono-crop plantation has been unmanaged for decades and is thick with self-seeded scots pine. Cairngorm Woodlands would like to begin thinning the weakest pine trees to allow the larger healthier trees to thrive. Relieving congestion will improve standing strength and biodiversity. Natural regeneration will be encouraged in small clearings. We would like to encourage more flora and fauna diversity; bees, birds, bats, and insects in the local area in particular. Native wildflowers can be seeded in small clearings, verges and where light is improved. Bat and bird boxes will be installed.

Rotten or dead wood will be piled for insect/mammal/bird habitation.

Thank you for the consultation about thinning at Tolquhonie wood, plot 18 (NH 917240).

These woods are used by capercaillie, and we would advise that the thinning works should be carried out outside the capercaillie breeding season.

In terms of nearby European sites designated for capercaillie, we advise that the works could have a likely significant effect because they contain capercaillie, and the thinning would cause disturbance, but there is not likely to be any impact on the integrity of the any of the SPA sites if the work is carried out outside the breeding season for capercaillie (1 April to 15 August). Thinning the woodland is likely to benefit capercaillie by increasing light levels and hence the vigour of any blaeberry present. Blaeberry is an important food source for capercaillie. Consideration could be given to variable thinning to create a range of conditions which would maximise the benefits for capercaillie.

Your enquiry has been passed to me as one of the operations officers based in the Aviemore area. Apologies that it's taken us some time to get back to you.

As I'm sure you're aware, due to the likely usage of Dalbuaick Plantation by capercaillie associated with the suite of Strathspey Special Protection Areas (SPAs) any development which could result in loss of suitable habitat supporting capercaillie, or would result in disruptive activities during the sensitive capercaillie breeding season (March to August), could have a Likely Significant Effect on these SPAs and therefore a Habitats Regulations Appraisal (HRA) would be required. This would be carried out by the relevant competent authority.

The information required to inform an HRA would include;

- Details of the proposed operation including timing, equipment to be used and area of the works
- Information on latest and historic capercaillie usage and sightings in the vicinity (at least within 1km)

Up-to-date capercaillie survey information can be obtained by speaking to [REDACTED] at RSPB. We would advise that in any case contact is made with [REDACTED] prior to developing proposals within capercaillie woodland in Strathspey as she will be able to provide advice on how capercaillie may, or may not, use these areas and what mitigation measures may be put in place. NatureScot do not hold additional data on capercaillie that would be relevant to an HRA, we request such data from [REDACTED] at RSPB.

Ourselves and [REDACTED] would also be able to provide advice on how best to manage woodland to benefit capercaillie, for example selective thinning to create open glades and a more variable understory.

I hope the above is helpful and do let me know if you have further queries.

Dear Nature Scot,

I have been asked to consult on a habitat regulations assessment for part of the Dalbuaick Plantation, Carrbridge, to ensure due process in any planning matters.

A license for Dalbuaick Plantation thinning has now been issued by Scottish Forestry (REF: FPA-11580). Noting that Scottish Forestry has been through an HRA and consulted with Nature Scot recently for this, this email is seeking any relevant information that Nature Scot can share relating to an HRA for any future planning applications at Dalbuaick. It may be that your office can forward on the same information.

- **Forest:** Dalbuaick Plantation, Carrbridge, Plot 18 - map attached
- **Relevant SPAs:** Kinveachy Forest and Abernethy Forest

The two SPA mentioned are ancient pine forests; nature reserves within flying distance, which makes them 'connected', for the purpose of habitat regulations. The principal species sensitivity seems to be capercaillie.

HRA Requirements

As a pine forest plantation, this seems to automatically qualify Dalbuaick as requiring habitat regulations assessment for certain planning purposes, and for the forestry activity now licensed. The Regulations describe that, under the circumstances, an authorising body must conduct an appropriate assessment of the likelihood of any substantial risk to relevant SPAs/qualifying species, as part of an HRA.

- **Would you please confirm this?**

Background Information

Dalbuaick is a 199-acre Scots pine plantation opposite Dalbuaick Farm, with predominantly moss undergrowth. Please see the attached map for reference. The plantation has a simplified ecosystem due to its closed canopy. A lack of historic management over 40+ years is linked to fragmented ownership at Dalbuaick. This contrasts with Tolquhonie, which is a separate 400-acre managed plantation to the north, overseen by Scottish Woodlands.

Information Requested

This inquiry seeks any information that may be relevant to an HRA. It is important to check for any capercaillie data that Nature Scot can share, to ensure the relevant facts are considered.

Extinct Lek

In consultation with Forestry Scotland, a reference was made by Nature Scot to a potential lek site in Tolquhonie Forest. RSPB data shows this to be an extinct lek site, [REDACTED]. RSPB data of this monitored site shows that it was abandoned 6+ years ago.

It would be very helpful to set up a communications channel with Nature Scot so that any changes to this are taken into consideration.

Please advise how Nature Scot could help and notify any known changes.

Contact could also be made with RSPB.

Many thanks for your consideration of this matter. I will be most grateful if you would share any relevant information and confirm that the requirement for an HRA is automatically required for this land due to the proximity to the two SPAs. I can then get in touch with other stakeholders, including CNPA, to make sure everyone is on the same page and due process is followed.

I'm hoping you can help with a query regarding a planning enforcement case we're currently dealing with. You may be aware of a similar (related) enforcement appeal that we were involved with at the same site last year.

It concerns the siting of a caravan, formed of a storage container unit, in an area of woodland just outside Carrbridge. The site address is Tolquhonie, Carrbridge, Highland, PH23 3NA – see location plan attached. The development has already been undertaken, and the caravan is currently in place. The woodland itself is not a European site, but we're aware of the wider network of Special Protection Areas in the surrounding area, for which capercaillie are a qualifying species. We're also aware that the need to protect the qualifying interests of SPAs extends beyond the designations themselves.

The case centres around whether there are permitted development rights for siting a caravan/s in this area of woodland. The Town and Country Planning (General Permitted Development) (Scotland) Order 1992 grants permitted development rights for caravans alongside forestry operations and other recreational uses in certain circumstances. However, these provisions are all subject to conditions and / or limitations, which we're currently looking at in detail.

The main purpose of my email is to seek your advice on the application of the Conservation (Natural Habitats, &c.) Regulations 1994 to this case. Reg 60(1) states that before exercising any permitted development rights for a development that is likely to have a significant effect on a European site, and which is not directly connected with or necessary to the management of the site, the developer must first apply for and receive approval from the planning authority. To help settle the initial issue of whether there would be a likely significant effect on a European site, Reg 61(1) enables an applicant to submit a request to the appropriate nature conservation body for their opinion on whether such an effect is likely.

The developer did not apply for our approval prior to siting the caravan, and it's unclear whether any opinion was sought from you on whether the development would have likely significant effects on any European site. Had we received an application (either the CNPA in calling in an application, or Highland Council in receiving an application), Reg 62 would have required us to consult with you and only approve the development if either: you concluded there would be no likely significant effects; or we undertook an Appropriate Assessment and concluded it would not adversely affect the integrity of any European site.

I'm therefore hoping you can help us with two key questions to inform our approach on the current enforcement case:

- Have you received any request under Reg 61(1) for your opinion on whether siting a caravan/s in this location would have a likely significant effect on any European site?
- In your opinion, is the siting and occupation of a caravan/s in this location (whether associated with forestry or any other general recreational use) likely to have a significant effect on any European site? We're particularly interested in your views on any likely significant effects on the network of Special Protection Areas in the vicinity of the woodland in question. For information, it's our opinion that the use of caravans or similar structures suitable for habitation in this location would increase human disturbance within the woods and potentially reduce the habitat available for capercaillie supported by the network of SPAs and associated woodlands in this part of Strathspey. That opinion underpinned our enforcement action on a previous caravan and associated infrastructure in the same area of woodland, and our approach to huts in the nearby woods at Baddengorm, Carrbridge.

Any advice you can provide would be greatly appreciated – we're under a bit of time pressure with this case, so a quick response would be welcomed.

I look forward to hearing from you – please feel free to get back to me if you'd like to discuss any of this in the meantime.

Many thanks for getting in touch regarding the Tolquhonie woodland caravan/s case. We've not been contacted for our opinion on the proposal at this site and whether it's likely to have a significant effect on any of the SPA.

However, we have been contacted by [REDACTED] on behalf of Moonrise, about a separate location in Dalbuaick Plantation (approx. NH91592381). They asked for us to confirm whether an HRA would be required to inform any future planning applications at this location which we confirmed would be the case given the likelihood that capercaillie associated with the suite of Strathspey SPAs utilise this area of woodland and could be significantly affected by any works that could result in disturbance, an increase in recreation or changes to available habitat. They did not provide any details regarding what kind of proposals they were referring to or request our advice on whether such proposals would result in a likely significant effect to the SPAs.

Our opinion would be that the occupation of caravan/s in Tolquhonie woods would have a likely significant effect on the suite of Strathspey SPAs (Anagach Woods SPA, Cairngorms SPA, Craigmore Wood SPA, Abernethy Forest SPA and Kinveachy Forest SPA) due to the risk of disturbance to capercaillie as a result of any increase in human disturbance. This would only be compounded by the addition of other, similar structures at neighbouring Dalbuaick Plantation or else where in this area of woodland, as the email from [REDACTED] implied was the intension.

Happy to discuss further and offer additional advice as necessary.

Yes this person got in contact with us to basically ask for clarification on whether a HRA would be required for any planning applications (he didn't specify what) at this location. I confirmed that this would be the case given that the woodland may support caper associated with the suite of Strathspey SPAs.

I advised that any HRA would be reliant on up-to-date data on caper usage of the area, and that this is something that yourself at RSPB lead on. I recommended he get in touch with you to understand the sensitivity of the site further.

As far as I'm aware CNPA would carry out any HRA required, with NatureScot's input, as they would be the competent authority for any planning applications made.

I think this enquiry is actually separate to the site at Tolquhonie where they've been given an eviction notice. CNPA have been in touch about that one as they're trying to work out what advice etc Moonrise has had on it (none from us).

██████ recommended that a review of RSPB information that was carried out on capercaillie usage, if any, in the vicinity of Dalbuaick Plantation.

This for the purpose of a Habitat Regulations Appraisal.

I have been tasked with obtaining all relevant information so that any capercaillie activity near to Dalbuaick is well understood and properly considered by the relevant authority.
